Visual These items are at various locations throughout West Hobart. Sections of sandstone kerbing are located along the southern side of Franklin Street, the northern side of Goulburn Street near the intersection with Cavell Street, the Relationships eastern side of Frederick Street, the northern side of Melville Street where it connects with Hill Street, the southern side of Barrack Street near the intersection with Brisbane Street. Sandstone steps were found along Liverpool Street above Molle Street, and at Goulburn Street between the intersections of Cavell and Faraday Streets. A random rubble wall was located along Salvator Road.

Historical This sandstone road infrastructure provides evidence of the nineteenth/early twentieth century road pattern. Relationship:

Most of this road infrastructure is of sandstone construction. The early street kerbs appear to have been made of Description: large rectangular roughly pecked sandstone blocks. The later C19th early C20th kerbs, such as that in Franklin Street, appear to be more cylindrical in shape.

- The West Hobart Recreation Ground is located on flat land between Lansdowne Crescent, Gourlay and Hamilton Visual Streets. It is bordered by trees and shrubs, and is a pleasant landscape element set amongst a medium density Relationships residential area.
- Historical The land was granted to Thomas Fisher, according to Sprent's Survey 1841-1845. The ground is listed in the Tasmania Post Office Directory of 1892-1893, and first appears on the Metropolitan Drainage Board Plans 1906-**Relationship:** 1910. It has been used for local cricket and football matches, and other sporting and social activities for over one hundred years.
- The recreation ground consists of a large oval with cricket pitch in the centre. At the northern end on the oval is an Description: amenities block, and there are two older toilet blocks located along the eastern edge of the ground. A random rubble wall runs along the eastern boundary.
