and curved edge façade, as well as large pane windows and entrances situated under simple concrete porches.

For each place, it should be considered that it is this fabric which is of heritage significance, for its ability to demonstrate the Art Deco

style of architecture, which thereby lays testament to the interwar period, portraying the story of ongoing development in New Town.







of these places have timber panel doors.

As can be seen in each individual photo (and not warranting of comment in each individual case) some places have additional

characteristics such as decorative brackets, bargeboards with finial, half-timbered effect in gable and dormer windows.

For each place, it should be considered that it is this fabric which is of heritage significance, for its ability to demonstrate the

Federation Bungalow style of architecture, which thereby lays testament to the Federation period of time, portraying the story of

development in the area.

## **Character Description:**

A series of Federation Bungalows along Argyle Street are also included within this Heritage Area and contributes to its historic character.

# Summary of Significance:

The proposed Stoke Street Heritage Area is of historic cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

- The larger, more prominent buildings within the area represent highly intact examples of their architectural styles and contribute to the understanding of the early development of New Town.
- The collections of largely intact Federation Bungalow and Federation Queen Anne residences contribute to the understanding of the pattern of development within New Town.





# Historical Overview:

New Town Road has been the main arterial road linking New Town to Hobart since the earliest establishment of the area. The road was among the first in the colony, being established in 1807 to connect the farms at new Town with Hobart Town (Scripps, 2006: 9). This road still survives as New Town Road and Pirie Street. New Town Road continues on to link the northern suburbs of the greater Hobart area

Commercial activities of New Town have been concentrated and mostly confined to New Town Road since establishment of the suburb (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 2). As such, the buildings within this area have a rich history of commercial use and functions as the main service centre for this area.

A number of residential buildings are scattered among the commercial area, including several stone Georgian buildings and a prominent two-storey Tudor style residence, as well as several Federation dwellings.

# Summary of Significance:

The proposed New Town Road heritage area is of historic cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

- The area consists of individual places of high integrity that provide evidence of the original mixed residence and commercial nature of the area.
- The area contributes to the understanding of the pattern of development of the New Town area and more generally, that of the broader Hobart area.
- While generally inconsistent in form and scale (characteristic of the commercial and residential nature of the area) many of the individual places demonstrate fine examples of their architectural styles.
- The quality of Federation Queen Anne residences along Cross Street and Roope Streets contributes to an understanding of the pattern of development of the area and relate to the tendency to reside in close proximity to commercial and community services.





The area begins at the Maypole Hotel on the comer of Risdon Road and extends just past the intersection with Bromby Street. The heritage area includes Mercer Street and Tower Road, as well as a section of Midwood Street.






Also situated within this Heritage Area are two residential areas consisting of Federation Queen Anne places. There are also a number of Victorian Georgian residences along Valentine Street A number of more modern places exist within the area, as well as older places that have been modified quite substantially. However, these places are not considered to detract significantly from the heritage character of the area, as generally, their setback, site coverage, height and bulk are largely consistent with their surrounds.

# Summary of Significance:

The proposed Forster Street Heritage Area is of historic cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

- The area consists of two former stores occupying prominent corner positions and New Town Primary School amongst a primarily residential area, demonstrating the tendency to locate services within close proximity to residences.
- The area represents a largely intact collection of heritage places, including a mixture of Federation Queen Anne and Victorian Georgian residences.
- Strips of Federation Queen Anne places throughout the Heritage Area contribute to the streetscape qualities of the area, and places of other architectural styles contribute to the understanding of earlier development (ie. Victorian Georgian place closer to New Town Road



## **Historical Overview:**

The street name "Bellevue Parade" relates to the former grand residence located with the area "Belle Vue". Scripps (2006: 21-28) states that George Weston Gunning was granted a 44 acre lot near Government Farm c.1814. The land later passed to Captain John Briggs and, later still, to fellow sea captain John Bell. John Bell and Louisa Meredith lived at Belle Vue until 1841. Shortly afterwards, Belle Vue was let to GTWB Boyes, acting Colonial Secretary. Belle Vue was later owned by Samual Page, the mail-coach proprietor between Hobart-Launceston. In about 1930 the house was demolished, however, the foundations of the residence remain in the Council public reserve. Development within this area was influenced by the location of the railway, which was established in 1876 and later became a passenger service. The former New Town Station is situated within this area. Pearce and Doyle (1997: 38) state that Oldham Ave, Bellvue Parade, Bishop Street and Park Street was once part of Solomon's Estate and comprised 27 acres of orcharding into 20th century and that the whole area was subdivided into over 90 housing allotments between 1914 and 1916.









Image 2: Federation residence, 20 Clare Street

## **Historical Overview:**

This Heritage Area lies at the intersection of the New Town, Lenah Valley and Mount Stuart suburbs and is formed around Augusta Road and Clare

This area was once characterised by orchards, dairies and market gardens (Scripps, 1993). Large prestigious residences were located along Augusta Road, on large semi-rural allotments.

The earliest development along Augusta Road occurred closest to the Main Road, an important historical link between the Hobart area and outlying regions. Larger scale development and subdivision of the area took place in response to population growth population and advances in transport technology during the Interwar period. Similarly, Clare Street consists of a number of prestigious homes dating back to New Town's early development and to a time where New Town was still a semi rural area. This street included a market garden, on which agricultural activity and grazing took place into the 1910s. More intensified subdivision took place along Clare street and in the surrounding area during the Interwar period

# Character Description:

It is noted that only a relatively small section of Augusta Road lies within the suburb of New Town, with the majority in Lenah Valley, previously known as Kangaroo Valley. A previous heritage study undertaken for Hobart City Council (Terry, 2003) in the Lenah Valley area identifies several section of Augusta Road within heritage areas.

As a whole, the area consists of a collection of buildings of differing scales and styles.

This Heritage Area encompasses a number of grand Federation residences on Augusta Road and Clare Street, often set back from the road, as well as a Russian Orthodox Church and an Art Deco unit complex on Augusta Road.

The area also includes prominent buildings on Bedford Street, such as the Victorian Academic Classical style building "Roseville"

The area encompasses a series of smaller-scale weatherboard and brick Federation residences at the western end of Clare Street and a series of Federation Queen Anne residences along Seymour Street





## Historical Overview:

Pearce and Doyle (1997: 37) state that a boot factory was opened by Miles and Co in 1895, at the present day site of 6 Fraser Street. The venture was closed in 1903 and remained unoccupied until it was re-established as a boot factory in 1909 by Burrows and Meek (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 37). 1919 the building was converted into four flats and became known as "Kensington Flats" Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 37 state that numbers 10, 12, 14 and 16 (two of which are shown in the forefront of Image 2 above) may have been lived in by workers employed at the factory. Jennings and Seymour street are examples of Interwar subdivisions, which took place in New Town in response to large-scale housing demand during this period

# **Character Description:**

The Hope Street area consists largely of Federation Queen Anne residences. Kensington Flats is situated within Fraser Street and provides a prominent and distinctive landmark in the streetscape. There are also a number of Victorian Georgian residences within Fraser Street. Contributing to the character of this heritage area is the consistency in the streetscapes in terms of the size, height, setback and bulk of the residences.

The character of the area is still strongly reflective of original development, with a number of modest Interwar style homes and front gardens still intact.

# Summary of Significance:

The proposed Hope Street heritage area is of historic cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

- The area represents a largely intact collection of Federation Queen Anne residences, along with other places of similar styles, contributing to a high level of streetscape quality
- The consistency in the streetscape assists in demonstrating the pattern of development within this area.
- Residences in Jennings and Seymour Streets in particular represent a largely intact post WWI subdivision pattern and the houses are generally in strong reflection of an Interwar subdivision, each bounded by fences of low height and with houses are set at similar distances from the fence line. original condition. This is a rare intact streetscape of residences dating for this time. The pattern of front gardens in these streets contribute to the

heritage character to its surrounds.

**Description:** The remnants of the former Rosella factor that remain on site are cement foundations, and a tall brick *chimney stack*.

**Condition:** Predominantly intact.

History: A jam factory was established in 1934 by the Rosella Preserving Co. in Bell Street, who had bought 10 acres of the old Risdon Race Course in 1927

(Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 37). During WWII the factory 'was one of many Tasmanian enterprises that contributed to the war effort, concentrating its efforts on producing apple juice, apple butter and apple sauce for American soldiers stationed in Australia' (Scripps, 2006: 47). In 1966 the Tasmanian factory was

closed, and its location adjacent to the sports ground encouraged the Hobart City Council to purchase it (Scripps, 2006: 47).



Setting: Description: 9 Archer Street, New Town is a federation Queen Anne Residence. It is an irregular, single storey, brick building with a complex corrugated iron roof, boxed and bracketed eaves, a moulded frieze at the top of the wall above a dentilated brick course, and chimneys with a stuccoed panel and bracketed cornice. Setting:

Runnymede is situated within a largely residential area of New Town and is located at the end of a long driveway. This building is a discrete element of the urban landscape.

**Description:** 

Runnymede is an Old Colonial Regency style residence.

It is a symmetrical, single storey, ashlar sandstone building with a hipped roof, boxed eaves, cornice and tall chimneys with moulded tops. The front elevation is divided into three bays; the two outer bays are wings, each with pilasters at the corners and one double-hung window with 12 panes and louvered shutters. The bay between the wings is covered by a veranda under the main roof, with treillage and fretwork brackets, and approached by a short flight of steps. There is a central window with a panelled door to one side and matching window to the other. One side elevation was extended in 1850 to include a music room; this has a faceted bay window with a separate roof, stone mullions, and 3-paned casement windows with margin glazing and top lights. Buildings to the rear include the coach house stables (THR R2173). Mature plantings and gardens, which surround the house, contribute to its character.

Condition: History: Predominantly intact.

Runnymede was built in the early 1840's by Robert Pitcairn. In 1850, it was sold to Bishop Nixon, who added the music room. Soon after 1862, it was purchased by Captain Charles Bayley, who changed the name to 'Runnymede' after one of his ships. The Tasmanian Government bought the property in 1964, and the National Trust of Tasmania holds it on a 99-year lease (THR R2173).

A history of Runnymede was prepared by Gurnhill (2006) for the purposes of a site Interpretation Plan. The following is drawn from that source.

In 1804, the first European settlement at Sullivan's Cove occurred. Ten grants of 100 acres each were granted to free settlers, including one to Thomas Issell, which was on the site of today's Runnymede (Nigel Lewis Richard Aitken Pty Ltd, 1997:6).

In 1836 Lawyer Robert Pitcairn bought five acres of the Belle Vue Estate (now Runnymede) from John Bell. Initially named 'Cairn Lodge', the house was built c.1840.

Pitcairn played an important role in measures for legal reform in Tasmania and an end for convict transportation (Wilson, 2006: 2).

Pitcairn was committed to issues of justice, the maintenance of professional standards and law reform. He also participated in the establishment and administration of a number of organisations aimed at improving the social and intellectual life of the colony (Wilson, 2006: 5). In addition, he sought to implement a system of representative (elected) government (Wilson, 2006: 6).

In 1850, Pitcairn sold 'Cairn Lodge' to Bishop of Tasmania, Francis Russell Nixon, who renamed the property 'Bishopstowe'.

Nixon was the colony's first Anglican bishop and he made important contributions to the church in a wider field. He was a controversial figure in both politics and the church. Soon after his arrival, the Bishop was in conflict with Lieut.-Governor Sir John Eardley-Wilmot on the discipline of clergymen and the appointment of convict chaplains.

Following Nixon's ownership of the property, in 1864, Bishopstowe was purchased by Charles Bayley. For the next 100 years, the house remained in the ownership of this family, passing from Charles to his brother James, and then to James' wife Elizabeth, followed by his daughter Harriet Louisa, and eventually to her daughters, Emma and Hally.

The Bayley family was prominent in the whaling industry which brought great wealth to Hobart and influenced the development of the port and city. Charles Bayley changed the name of the property to Runnymede after his favourite whaling ship.

The house itself has evolved over time with the needs and requirements of the three families whose home it was, reflecting, at first, a home to a family of three children, followed by changes required to accommodate the bishop's 13 children (Wilson, 2006: 2). The roofline from the rear of the building demonstrates the process of evolution.

Runnymede provided its owners and occupants with a degree of comfort, a measure of rural seclusion, and an estate fitting their social aspirations.

# Significance:

61 Bay Road, New Town is of State level heritage significance as a place associated with the early development and settlement of the area, as well as being an excellent representative example of the Old Colonial Regency Style and of significance for its association with Robert Pitcairn, Francis Russell Nixon and the Bayley family. As a National Trust property open to the public, this place is also of value to the community.

**Setting:** The Boatsheds are situated on Cornelian Bay Road, off Bellevue Parade, New Town, at the southern end of Bay.

**Description:** The Boatsheds are rustic, vernacular structures of timber construction with iron medium pitched gabled roofs and date back

to the late nineteenth-early twentieth century. Many of the boatsheds have timber decks and/or jetties. "The Baths", a larger timber building, is situated to the east of the boatsheds and has a medium pitched hipped roof clad in corrugated

iron. There is a small projecting gable to the water façade.

**Condition:** The Boatsheds and the "Baths" are predominantly intact.

History: The first of the Cornelian Bay Boatsheds are said to have been built in 1892 by Chief Justice Sir John Stokell Dodds

(Scripps, 2006: 72). Further applications for the granting of licences to construct boatsheds were made in the early years of the twentieth century (Scripps, 2006: 72). Between 1901 and 1928 there were 38 successful applications for boatsheds. A standard design for the boatsheds was made to tighten management of the area, after concerns of overcrowding. The Wardens of the Marine Board also decided to restrict the construction of boatsheds to an area they selected at the southern

end of the beach (Scripps, 2006: 72).

The Cornelian Bay boatsheds were intended to house boats and provide revenue through rental fees. However, they were

also used as weekend holiday houses (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 36).

In 1925 a new jetty at Cornelian Bay was completed, including baths, jetty, changing rooms, caretaker's residence, diving

platform and springboard (Scripps, 2006: 61).

Cornelian Bay Beach was declared a public reserve in 1904 (Scripps, 2006: 58).

# Significance:

The Boatsheds, along with the "Baths" at Cornelian Bay, New town are of State level historic cultural heritage significance as a group for its ability to represent a rare, largely intact collection of late nineteenth to early twentieth century boatsheds. The group is also of significance as it adds to the understanding of early twentieth century recreational lifestyle.

Setting: Sacred Heart Church at 1 Cross Street, New Town is within a primarily residential area. This building forms part of Sacred Heart School,

which appears to comprise a number of buildings from the Federation and Interwar period on the same title.

**Description:** Sacred Heart Church is a Federation Gothic church building. It is an ashlar sandstone church with a typical ground-plan, a steep-pitched

corrugated iron gabled roof, boxed eaves, buttresses, string and label courses, and pointed arch openings. The sanctuary is a slightly lower, separately-roofed extension to one end of the main structure (the nave), and the vestry is a lower, separately-roofed wing to the junction between the nave and the Sanctuary. The vestry has an external chimney stack to the gable wall. The east window to the

Setting:

This place is situated within the residential section of New Town. Flint House is located on a large property, and the original section of the house is concealed by mature plantings and subsequent development on the property.

**Description:** 

Flint House is a symmetrical, two storey, ashlar sandstone building with a corrugated iron hipped roof and a low parapet constructed in the Victorian Regency style. There is a dormer window to one end of the front elevation, and several later skylights. One side elevation has a semi-circular bay with full length 8-paned windows on the north eastern. The other side elevation has two windows to both the ground and the first floor, double-hung with 12 panes, and label moulds to the ground floor. There is a later brick structure built very close to the rear elevation of lower significance. The front elevation is concealed by verandahs to both floors being fully enclosed and glazed at a later date. This structure has a separate skillion roof, with a central gable over a simple frontispiece containing the entrance (THR 2718)



Condition: Flint House has been previously modified with the enclosure of the verandah, removal of chimneys and installation of fire

escapes. The broader site has also been impacted upon by subsequent development.

History: Built by Robert Nicol who was gaoled in 1857 for embezzling the funds he used to built it RNE 11424).

Setting:

This building is situated within a primarily residential area and is a significant element in the urban landscape. It is surrounded by more modern buildings on the same title, which form part of the home.

**Description:** 

This is a single storey, ashlar sandstone Victorian Regency building with several wings, a corrugated iron hipped roof, tall corbelled chimneys with moulded tops, and several dormer windows double-hung with 12 panes. The ground floor windows are also double-hung with 12 panes. A verandah extends along part of two adjacent sides, and has been partially enclosed and glazed at a later date, the section remaining open has simple treillage (source THR R2240).

History:

The house occupies a part of the original 157 acre land grant to Charles Swanston Esq. It is stated that the date of construction of the house is unknown. It is noted by the Mary Ogilvy Homes Society (cited at http://www.maryogilvy.com.au/abuot\_mary.htm#a) that "in the Deed transferring the property from Lavington Roope, a well known Hobart businessman, to Mrs. Phillis Seal in 1856, the house is referred to as having been "lately built by Lavington Roope".

It is also noted that the house changed hands over the next fifty years and that in 1889, a mortgage deed described the house as "A well built stone residence with slates, coach house and other out-buildings and tennis court, (occupied by Mr Counsel), a weather board cottage, (occupied by W. Lyall), a stone house and stables, (occupied by Mr. Craustorm). The land also occupies about 7 acres or thereabouts in grass and about 2 to 3 acres in gardens and orchard and has very large frontages on the Main Road to New Norfolk, on Cross, Swanston, Ross and Montagu Streets."

It is stated that In 1919 Captain Kenneth Ogilvy purchased the house from T. W. Hopkins (source: http://www.maryogilvy.com.au/abuot\_mary.htm#a).

The house was purchased by the Society in 1946.

Setting:

Stainforth court is situated at 1 Queens Walk, adjacent to the Brooker Highway. The building is a dominating feature in the area. The site is between the Brooker Highway and Queen's Walk and is surrounded by the Cornelian Bay Cemetery and various sports fields.

**Description:** 

The complex is comprised of four multistorey blocks containing a number of one and two bedroom residential units. The buildings are set in spacious grounds that have been developed to include gardens, pedestrian paths, driveways and parking areas.

The buildings at Stainforth Court are of the International style of architecture featuring largely painted roughcast rendered walls. The buildings feature flat roofs clad in concrete pavers.

**Condition:** Predominantly intact

History:

The Stainforth Court complex was constructed in the late 1950s by the State Government's Housing Department for the provision of public housing. Scripps (2006, 43) states

"Following the completion of Brooker Avenue, the Stainforth Court block of flats were built by the Housing Department between the new highway and Queens Walk. The four blocks were completed in 1960 and provided accommodation in 31 one bedroom flats and 54 two bedroom flats. The department had already built the Windsor Court flats in Harrington Street, Hobart and other multi-storey blocks of flats were in progress at Augusta Road in New Town. The Director of Housing referred to the significance of this new approach to public housing, designed not only to relive the housing shortage but also to arrest the sprawling development that was becoming a characteristic of Australian Cities. Such developments were expensive to build but they could take advantage of existing infrastructure, unlike the new subdivisions, which require new roads and sewerage systems for example".

The Stainforth Court complex is a demonstration of International Style architectural design philosophy typified by Le Corbusier. Le Corbusier was an architect and urbanist who essentially proposed that towers set in open parkland provided a solution to the urban housing crisis of the time. His theory was that the modern architectural forms, with on site amenity a priority, would offer a new organisational solution that would ultimately raise the quality of life of lower socio-economic groups (source: http://architect.architecture.sk/le-corbusier-architect/le-corbusier-architect.php).

Stainforth Court was constructed at a lower density and height than that put forward by Le Corbusier, however it reflects the basic philosophy of Le Corbusier's proposed housing scheme in that it provides clusters of multi-storey apartment blocks of the International style, sited at sufficient distance apart to allow for adequate solar access to the lower storeys. The accommodation is located so as to provide for adequate space and recreational opportunities for residents through its location within a lot of sufficient size, and situated adjacent to parkland.

### Significance:

Stainforth Court at 1 Queens Walk, New Town is of State level historic cultural heritage significance a rare illustration of large scale, multi-storey public housing philosophies of the mid twentieth century. By comparison, most public housing in Tasmania is of lower density.



Setting:

The Cornelian Bay cemetery is situated to on a peninsula between Cornelian and New Town Bays. It occupies a site of over 40ha. The site overlooks the Derwent River, with industrial uses on the northern side of the Peninsula. Views of the cemetery are also available from the Queens Domain and Brooker Highway.

**Description:** 

The cemetery was originally designed so that there would be a separate part for each religious denomination. Today, the Church of England section is the largest, followed by the Roman Catholic area. Methodist, Independent or Congregational, Presbyterian, Baptist, Jewish and Quaker denominations are also represented. Other sections include War Graves, Garden of Remembrance and the Crematorium Gardens (Source: <a href="http://www.srct.com.au/history.html">http://www.srct.com.au/history.html</a>). The cemetery consists of areas dedicated to burials, memorials and cremations.

The cemetery encompasses a range of buildings. Two places are currently registered. These are the Jewish Cemetery and Receiving House, and the former caretaker's residence.

The former caretakers house is an example of a brick Old Colonial Style residence on a sandstone base. The place has a hipped roof, verandah and 12-paned double hung windows to the façade (THR R1587).

Remaining on site in close proximity to the former caretakers house is the former blacksmith's forge, a sandstone colonial structure associated with the government farm.

The Jewish cemetery comprises a receiving house, which is a small weatherboard building with a gabled roof. The building also features a pair of panelled central front doors and was designed by Henry Hunter (Source: <a href="http://www.srct.com.au/history.html">http://www.srct.com.au/history.html</a>). The site also consists of a small shelter, which was also designed by colonial architect Henry Hunter and constructed circa 1873.

Other buildings on site include the former crematorium, now used as a chapel and a more modern crematorium.

The styles of headstones vary from modest stones to elaborate sculptures and date from establishment of the cemetery in the 1870s to the present time.

There are numerous mature tree plantings throughout the cemetery including mature oaks and pine trees. There is number of more recent rose plantings that have been planted in memory of those who have died.

Condition: History: Buildings on site are predominantly intact. The conditions of the headstones vary.

European settlers in New Town established a Government Farm on what is now the Cornelian Bay Cemetery.

The produce from the Government Farm supplied food to the various institutions of Hobart (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 12). Thirty convicts were sent to the area for this purpose. This farm was the central agricultural enterprise in the colony for a number of years. 50 acres of different grains were planted by 1805 (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 8) The former caretakers residence is the only remaining building from the large complex associated with the old Government Farm (THR R1587).

In the late 1850s this land was subdivided into 30 lots of between three and five acres, however, the lots were not sold. The site of the cemetery was selected in the 1850s after concerns were raised over the poor condition of the church burial grounds in Hobart. Governor William Denison (1847-1855) first suggested the site as a cemetery. One of the advantages of the site was its location. As a peninsula, the site could not be built around, thus avoiding becoming a plague hazard. There were delays in establishing the cemetery, because parts of the former Government Farm had been sold and had to be reacquired. In 1870, government passed a Bill approving 8,000 pounds for the purposes of establishing a cemetery. Trustees were appointed and development began. A design competition was held for the layout of the cemetery, the winning entry designed by Surveyor EJ Burgess which was considered the most economical to implement. Thirty years later, the *Mercury* described the cemetery as having 'park-like dimensions and sweeping avenues of pines and cedars which combine to give a look of stateliness and grandeur' (HCC, 2004: 2-3).

As a general cemetery, sections were reserved for the various denominations, with one-third left for future uses. The cost of a single interment was one pound and ten shillings, however free burials were granted to paupers. The cemetery opened in July 1872, and the first burial was of Bridget Ryan, who died from typhoid fever in 1872 at the age of twelve years (Source: <a href="http://www.srct.com.au/history.html">http://www.srct.com.au/history.html</a>). Many notable figures from Tasmania's history are interred at Cornelian Bay including George Adams (founder of Tatersalls); Henry Jones (founder of IXL Jams), and John Blundstone (Blundstone Boots).

### Significance:

The Cornelian bay Cemetery at 27 Queens Walk, New Town is of State level heritage significance, for its historical importance, for its potential to yield further information and for the meanings attributed to the cemetery by the community and for the structures within, dating to the early days of the cemetery and some to the former government farm. 

Setting: The St Johns Park Cemetery, including the Matthew Forster Monument at 12 St John's Avenue, New Town is one of part of the overall St

Johns Park.

**Description:** Monuments relating to the former use as a cemetery have been removed, excepting the Forster monument. The monument is an

ashlar sandstone obelisk on a classical pedimental base, and a stepped platform of Victorian Free Classical design. (Source: THR

R5964).

**Condition:** The cemetery has been previously impacted upon. The only remaining monument is to Captain Forster. The remainder of the

monuments have been removed and the place is now a grassed area with a few trees.

**History:** In the 1830s the government established an orphan school to provide charitable care for orphaned boys and girls. The orphans

came from a variety of areas, including the South Hobart Female Factory, convict ships and from parentless families. Some

children were admitted simply to gain access to education.

Two cemeteries were established at St John's, one for the Church of England, and the other for Roman Catholics. The

cemeteries were located to the south-west of the Church, was the centre of the institution. The Church of England cemetery was approximately five acres in size, divided by a network of paths. A small chapel was also located within the cemetery. In 1838 the cemetery was consecrated by Bishop Broughton, some four years after the earliest known burial in 1834. Many orphans at the institution were buried at the cemetery in unmarked graves. Private individuals were also interred in the cemetery, including

military men and their families. Included were Colonel Bernard and his family; Colonel Cruikshank and his daughter; Sergeant Major Costello and Captain Nairn. Members of the clergy were also interred at St John's, including the Reverend JT Ewing (third

Chaplain of St John's); Archdeacon Mason, and the Reverend W Murray (HCC, 2004: 13).

The Roman Catholic Cemetery was established in 1852, specifically for the burial of children from the orphan schools. This was a small triangular area of land, connected to the eastern boundary of the Church of England cemetery. Both cemeteries probably closed around 1872.

In 1963, all monuments were removed from the cemetery, except for that of Captain Forster. This is a monument erected by private friends of Matthew Forster who died January 6 1846. During his life in Tasmania he successively held the office of Chief Police Magistrate, Colonial Secretary and Comptroller General of Convicts (Source: THR R5964).

The St Johns Park area has a history of use as charitable institutions, hospital, training school, a consumptive sanatorium, and a home for war veterans and disabled children (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 51).

The St John's Park Cemetery is of State level heritage significance, for its historical importance, for its potential to yield further information and for the associations with the orphans, and prominent members of colonial society buried there. As part of the broader institutional complex, the cemetery demonstrates part of the colonial government's policies towards care of children, their care, death and interment. The Monument is erected in memory of prominent Tasmanian, Matthew Forster who made a substantial contribution to society in his time as Chief Police Magistrate, Colonial Secretary and Comptroller General of Convicts and demonstrates a creative achievement as a representative example of a Victorian Free Classical monument.

symmetrically located on each side of St Johns Church. Although the roof dormers have been added to Archers' design, and part of the southern building has been demolished, the power of symmetrical design remains (Source: THR R5963).

These buildings have a history of use as orphan schools, as well as charitable institutions, a hospital, training school, a consumptive sanatorium, a home for war veterans and disabled children (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 51).

### Significance:

The former Orphan School at St Johns Park is of State level heritage significance because it has the ability to demonstrate the evolution and pattern of development in the local area and for its use over time for institutionalisation purposes. The place has research potential pertaining to this role. The building also demonstrates the primary elements of Victorian Tudoresque style and is associated with Colonial Architect John Lee Archer.






Image 2: Façade of Former Orphanage

Setting:

The complex consists of an Anglican Church, former orphanage and the St John's Park Cemetery. It is the central element in a precinct at the end of an axial avenue (Source: THR R2261). There are a number of more modern buildings within the complex. Also contributing to the complex, however, on a separate title are the two St John's watch houses.

**Description:** 

St Johns Anglican Church is an Old Colonial Gothick Picturesque building designed by John Lee Archer. It is a stone church with a three storey square tower with corner turrets and castellated parapet. Windows are tall arched lancets and feature label moulds. Arcades on both sides link the church to the Orphan's school. The rectory was also designed by John Lee Archer and is a single storey sandstone building with a basement. It is located some distance away at the rear of the St Johns Park Hospital site. A cemetery was once located at

St Johns (source: THR R2261), however only one monument (to Captain Forster) remains. Subsurface remains exist.

The former Orphanage comprises a pair of two storey brick buildings of Victorian Tudoresque design. There is a gabled iron roof with large dormers splitting the line of the eaves and end gables with a castellated parapet. There are bracketed eaves. The northern building remains at its full length - and a section of southern building has been demolished (Source: THR R5963). Windows are double hung sashes of large panes and stone sills. Corbelled chimneys feature to gable ends. The entrance features a four-panelled door and arched label mould.

Further research is required to determine the curtilage of the buildings of significance on site and to establish if there are other items of heritage significance on site. It is noted that the sandstone rectory referred to on the THR datasheet was not viewed as part of the site visits for this study and therefore requires further research.

Condition: History: Predominately intact, headstones from the cemetery (excepting the Forster monument) were removed in 1963.

John Lee Archer, Colonial Architect, designed both the Anglican church and the Victorian Tudoresque orphanage buildings (Source: THR R2261).

The former orphanage buildings have a history of use as orphan schools, as well as charitable institutions, a hospital, training school, a consumptive sanatorium, a home for war veterans and disabled children (Pearce and Doyle, 1997: 51).

Two cemeteries (Church of England and Roman Catholic) were established at the site, serving the needs of both the orphans and the private population. The cemetery closed around 1872, and all bar one monument (to Captain Forster) were removed in 1963. The Monument to Captain Matthew Forster was erected by friends of Matthew Forster who died 6 January 1846. During his life in Tasmania he successively held the office of Chief Police Magistrate, Colonial Secretary and Comptroller General of Convicts (Source: THR R5964).

### Significance:

St Johns complex is of State level heritage significance because it has the ability to demonstrate the evolution and pattern of development in the local area and the themes of religion and institutionalisation within its local context and that of the State. The complex is also of significance in containing an Old Colonial Gothick Picturesque church and the former orphanage buildings of Victorian Tudoresque design. The buildings are also of importance for their association with Colonial architect John Lee Archer. The site also contains the cemetery, with the sole remaining monument to Captain Matthew Forster.

The building incorporates an earlier brick Georgian cottage. The main dwelling was built c.1842 for the Hon. T D. Chapman. Chapman was a merchant and politician, who arrived in Van Diemen's Land in 1841, where he established commercial operations. He

began his political career with the Anti-Transportation League, and in 1851 was elected to the Legislative Council. Chapman was also elected to the first House of Assembly, and served roles as Treasurer (ABD Online). William Porden Kay designed Sunnyside. He was an architect, surveyor, engineer and public servant. As the nephew of Sir John Franklin, Kay was invited to Van Diemen's Land, however struggled to find official positions due to charges of nepotism. Kay designed both private and public works during his time in Tasmania, including his own home Barrington Lodge. Notable public works include St Mary's Hospital, the Hobart markets, additions to the Hobart Criminal Court, and undoubtedly his greatest work was Government House (ABD online).

### Significance:

7 Swanston Street, New Town is of State level heritage significance as a place associated with the early development and settlement of the area, as well as being a representative example of the Old Colonial Grecian style and for its association with the Hon. T D. Chapman and architect William Porden Kay.

Setting: All the Victorian Georgian places in the following datasheets are situated in close proximity to the street frontage, thereby contributing

historic character to the streetscape.

**Description:** The following places are all examples of single storey Victorian Georgian places (unless otherwise stated).

The features which each of these places demonstrate, as examples of the Victorian Georgian style are a symmetrical façade, a medium pitched hipped roof, a verandah under either a broken back or separate roof, slender verandah posts, and a simple chimney. As can be seen in each individual photo some places have additional characteristics such as sash windows with either small or large panes, a panelled timber door, transom and side lights, decorative valance, and either close or boxed eaves.

For each place, it should be considered that it is this fabric which is of heritage significance, for its ability to demonstrate the Victorian Georgian style of architecture, which thereby lays testament to the Victorian period of time, portraying the story of development in the

area.
